# Didymochlaena truncatula Mahogany Fern

Family: <u>Dryopteridaceae</u>

Genus: <u>Didymochlaena</u> did-ee-moh-KLAY-ee-nuh

Species: <u>truncatula</u>

I'm often asked what is a good fern to grow inside the house. I tell them about the mahogany fern. This is a very pretty, erect, low light fern that has beautiful shades of color. It is a low maintenance fern that does not shed or need constant pruning. It prefers evenly moist soil but will take a bit of over watering or under watering. What more can you ask for in a fern?

The fern itself is a medium to large fern, but grows upwards with an erect rhizome and fronds making a whorl or basket-shaped appearance. With time, offshoots can occur and maybe be removed to form new plants or left alone to make a fuller plant. The leaves are leathery and rectangular and can survive being bumped in a traffic area.

The name comes from the Greek word didy-mos meaning double and chlaina meaning cloak. The cloak is taken from the indusium that wraps around to cover both sides of the vein. The sorus is in a horseshoe shape.

Mahogany fern can also be grown outside in a shaded area. It is a semi-tender fern so should not be left out for a freeze. My experience with this fern is that it's easy to grow provided it does not get too bright of light. Like most ferns it does like humidity so in the house put it on a water tray with pebbles or marbles to keep the plant from sitting in the water while it receives the needed humidity.

For me the best part of this fern is the color. I love the mahogany colored new leaves that turn a darker richer color with age. If you're not growing this fern now, you might want to add it to your collection.
