A message from our President:

Hi Everyone,

I wonder if spring has arrived. This is the difficult time for our area. You never know when the last freeze may occur. A lot of my yard plants and ferns really burned with this last freeze. We were about 23 degrees for 16-18 hours. It has taken a month to show the damage on a few things, and time will tell on a few other plants. I hope you faired ok.

I enjoyed Larry's presentation on etching. The picture frames turned out so nice. He went to a lot of work for us to have a nice clean picture frame to use for our fern stencil. We will have to give Larry a break for a few months before we can get him to do something else for us. Thank you Larry.

This month we will be doing a presentation on terrarium ferns. We will be learning how to put a terrarium together and care for it once it is done. So you need to bring a container to use as your terrarium. Glass is best, but a good clear plastic can work too. You will also need something to use for a lid that will seal and hold the moisture in to make the greenhouse effect. We will provide you with perlite, charcoal, potting mix, and three ferns. The ferns are different than the ones we used last time. If your terrarium from last time did really well and you need to divide some ferns, please bring them to the meeting and share with those who were not able to attend before.

In March we will have a guest speaker coming in from Miami FL to talk to us about the horsetail ferns, *Equisetum.* Chad Husby has had an active role in researching the many different *Equisetums* around the world. He had been associated with the University of Florida for years and is now with Fairchild Botanical Gardens in Miami. This will be a PowerPoint presentation and we will have some show and tell as well. These are amazing ferns and date back to the fossil records, so I hope you plan on attending. April is our field trip and Larry is scoping out where we are going this time. We will have more information on this soon.

In May, Joan Hudson will be talking to us about another old fern with a prehistoric look and growing system, the *Psilotum nudum*. We will learn a lot from Joan on this very strange yet unique fern.

For the Board members, we will have a brief boardmeeting after our February meeting. Let me know if you will not be able to attend.

"Ferns for Terrarium or Bottle Gardens" by Darla Harris

Who does not love that pop of nature in our homes but growing plants in our humidity free homes in the Houston area can be a challenge. We go from the AC to the heater with no time to just open a window so the humidity is sucked out of our homes. Glass containers can be found everywhere these days, very small to very large or tall to fit almost any size fern. Stores also carry miniature items so you can build landscapes to make your terrarium more interesting. The variety of ferns are amazing, you can pick and choose so many colors, textures, and sizes. Adiantum - maidenhair ferns; Davallia - a footed fern such as the rabbits foot fern; Pteris ensiformis 'Victoriae'; Asplenium - several miniature ones to choose from; Selaginella; just to name a few.

Getting started:

- A suitable container that can be sealed, glass works best but a clear plastic can work too. A lid, plastic wrap or a clear plate for a lid.
- Perlite: Helps to prevent over watering. Place in the bottom of the container.
- Charcoal: Keeps the soil sweet. On top of the perlite or mix together.
- Potting mix (moisten and microwave for 10 minutes on high let cool) or cut/sphagnum moss. Evenly moist not wet.
- Place your fern into the soil mix.

Maintaining your terrarium:

- Don't over water. You should see condensation on the lid. If there is a lot of condensation you may take the lid off part way and let it dry out some.
- Don't under water. If you do not see any condensation use a spray bottle of water and spray the sides of the container letting it wet the soil. Just moist.
- Don't fertilize your ferns. If you do see discoloration you can use 1/4 strength even number fertilizer.
- Temperature is best about 70 to 80 degrees.
- For light you can place on a window sill provided it is not a west window. You can use artificial light by using a table lamp or fluorescent light.
- Do not place your terrarium on a heat source such as a TV or heater.

A sealed terrarium should be checked for water every six months unless you see an issue with the condensation. If you should see a buildup of salt (a white crusting of the soil), just remove the affected soil and replace with fresh.

Hemionitis arifolia - The Heart Fern

Family:	Hemionitidaceae	
Genus:	Hemionitis hem-ee-oh-NYE-tiss	
Species:	arifolia air-ih-FOH-lee-uh	

The heart fern is another one of those ferns that doesn't look like a fern. It has very dark green heartshaped fronds that are on black stems. They are dimorphic meaning they have two sets of fronds, fertile and sterile. The fertile fronds can get to be about 10" tall. The leaves are thick and leathery and put on a rather pretty spore pattern.

This is a tropical fern and prefers warm temperatures but mine have been in the mid 30's and survived but with burnt fronds. High humidity is a must for them and they can be grown well in a terrarium setting. What they cannot take is over watering. They will rot. If they dry out too much the fronds will curl up. If you provide them with water soon enough, they will uncurl and be just fine.

They reproduce from spore but also with a vegetative reproduction. They pup, and can be grown easily from the plantlet.

This is a cute little fern and a nice addition to your collection.
